C. G. Jung Institute Zurich

The C. G. Jung Institute Zurich is accredited by the Swiss Charta for Psychotherapy, www.psychotherapiecharta.ch, and is under the supervision of the Department of Justice and the Interior of the Canton of Zurich and accredited by the Board of Health of the Canton of Zurich. The Institute is also an organizational member of National Association for the Advancement of Psychoanalysis, NAAP, <http://www.naap.org/>. As an international organizational member of NAAP, the Institute aligns with policies of the American Board for Accreditation which accredits institutes in the United States.

The Institute was established in 1948 as a Foundation to train analysts and psychotherapists and create a centre for research in Analytical Psychology. C. G. Jung (1875-1961), famous Swiss psychiatrist and psychotherapist and one of the most significant thinkers of the twentieth century, he himself designed the concept and supervised its activities until his death.

Analytical psychology aims at integration and maturation of the personality. It does not view psychic problems simply as disturbances that lead to mental and physical disease and can be treated apart from the person as a whole. There are in fact two therapeutic goals that cannot be separated: individuation and healing of psychic disturbances.

Jung originally developed his methods at the Psychiatric Hospital "Burghölzli". He was not primarily interested in abstract theories, but in effective therapeutic means for helping persons deal with their present needs and contributing to their mental development. So his methods – face to face conversation, active imagination, creative work with dreams, fantasies, painting – can be applied in a clinical setting as well as in private practice.

International Postgraduate Training Program

Modified Conception (since Winter 2006/07)

The training program of the C. G. Jung Institute consists of three areas (see also regulations i, international version): theory, personal analysis, and analytical/therapeutic work with clients done under supervision. The training requires a minimum of 8 semesters, with attendance in Zurich for 3 weeks each semester.

In addition, a clinical internship is required.

Theory

The English Courses are offered in blocks of 3 weeks, both in winter and summer during the last 3 weeks of the semester.

The first week in summer and the two first ones in winter cover subjects such as psychiatry, theory of neurosis, developmental psychology, an association experiment, and clinical questions. During the second and third week in summer and the third week in winter, candidates take part in the Intensive Courses open to an international public.

Examinations

Propaedeuticum and Diploma examinations are both taken in two parts. Examinations take place during the first week of the blocks and, if necessary, on some days before or after. There are Propaedeuticum and Diploma Examinations on subjects such as Fundamentals of Analytical Psychology, Comparative Developmental Psychology, Comparative Theory of Neurosis, Fundamentals of Psychiatry and Psychopathology, Clinical Psychiatry, Diagnosis and Therapy, Psychology of dreams, Comparative Religion, Fundamentals in Ethnology, Psychology of Myths and Fairy Tales, Psychological Understanding of Pictures, Symbols of the Individuation Process, Individual Case

Papers

In addition to the two symbol papers – one before, one after Propaedeuticum – and the paper on the association experiment, shorter papers of approximately 5 pages are required on a chosen topic belonging to the subjects of examinations (with the exception of psychiatry and neurosis). They have to be sent in together latest 4 weeks before the exam. However, exams will not be restricted to the topic of the paper.

Personal Analysis

The personal analysis (300 hours at least) can be done in the home country/permanent residence of the candidate with an IAAP analyst (member of the International Association for Analytical Psychology) who has practised for at least 5 years.

These analysts have to be accepted by the Institute and will be bound to it by a special contract for the time of analysis.

Control Case Work

Diploma candidates can do their clinical work with analysands/patients in their home countries/permanent residence. If necessary, i. e. if they are not covered by the Institute's assurance there, they will have to take out a policy of their own.

Individual Supervision

At least half of the required 80 hours of individual supervision have to be done with at least two training analysts of the C. G. Jung Institute Zurich. This means 3 hours per week on an average, during the 4 semesters (blocks) after Propaedeuticum.

For the remaining hours of supervision, the candidate is required to present a plan to the Director of Studies. The supervisors (IAAP analysts who have practised for at least 5 years) will be bound by contract to the Institute for the time of supervision.

Control Case Colloquia

During the three-week periods, 2 control case colloquia of 5 sessions each are offered in each period. The candidates have to participate in at least 6 of the block colloquia in order to fulfill at least half of the requirement of 60 sessions.

Otherwise, Regulations i (International Version) or regulations CH (Swiss Charta) apply and are compulsory.

Admission

The C. G. Jung Institute Zurich accepts applications for the training (Programs E and C) from persons with graduate degrees in all academic fields (at least a master's degree or its equivalent). Program K accepts applications from persons who have graduated from a university-level higher education program or who have the Swiss Matura or its equivalent and have also completed additional specialist training and a diploma in the area of psychology, education or health-related fields.
